During his 14 years of distinguished service on the bench in Kansas City, Kansas, Judge Waxse authored several noteworthy and influential decisions on e-discovery, civil procedure, search warrants, and various other subjects. He has been a proponent of cooperation amongst litigants as a way to secure the “just, speedy, and inexpensive determination of every action,” as mandated by Rule 1 of the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure. He has earned a reputation as a well-known scholar on e-discovery. Prior to being appointed to the bench, Judge Waxse practiced at the law firm Payne and Jones and was a partner at the law firm of Shook, Hardy & Bacon. In addition, he was a member of the national boards of the American Civil Liberties Union, the Lawyers’ Committee for Civil Rights Under Law, and the American Judicature Society.
